

President Klaus and the last signature

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The president of the Czech republic, Vaclav Klaus, always was against the european unification, and is the last one who yet has to sign the Lisbon Treaty. He and the Polish president, Lech Kaczynski, were waiting for the outcome of the Irish referendum, hoping that a "NO" from the irish people would spare them the unpleasant trouble of sinking that sort of Constitution, which is called "Treaty". It consists of more of 300 pages, no european citizen ever read it, but without it the European Union cannot reach a full political status.

Unfortunately, the Irish betrayed the passion for their Homeland and Freedom that always was a trademark in their history; they let themselves to be bribed by the glitter of the very generous gifts that José M. Barroso - who is the most interested in the birth of the new empire - offered them.

After the obstacle of Ireland was passed, the polish President had to sign the Constitution, which had already been ratified by the Parliament in 2008. The solemn ceremony took place in Warsaw in the presidential palace, in front of Mr. Barroso, of the Swedish premier Fredrik Reinfeldt (president on duty of the European Union), and of Jerzy Buzek, president of the European parliament. I am listing their names so that our readers will notice how much we went backwards to a medieval empire: we are governed and commanded by foreigners, we do not know them and even if they deigned themselves to talk to us we would not understand what they say.

At the very last moment, Kaczynski was able to add a marginal note to the Treaty, with a derogation for Warsaw concerning its character of national State. It is obvious that these final repentances are the most evident sign of the cowardice of the governors, who are unable to oppose to the european unification, although they perceive its

incalculable importance; at the same time they are such autocrats that they do not leave the decision to the People.

Now that also Kaczynski gave in, all eyes are on Prague. How is it possible that someone who survived the Soviet hell decides, on his own will, to give up independence and freedom and to become again part of an empire? No country in Europe is safe from a very strong dictatorship, which is self evident in the antidemocratic way that until now was used to impose the resolutions of the Commissars. (Think about the name "Commissar" that they chose instead of "Minister": it is the same name used by the soviet government, and it is not not by chance that it is a "Union", too). The dictatorship will be indispensable to keep order and to govern more than half a billion of people belonging to different homelands, different languages, histories and customs.

Vaclav Klaus knows this al too well, and always showed his aversion to the European Union. Now he cannot procrastinate any more, even if he asked - as as a condition - for a derogation from the Treaty which will safeguard the sovereignty of its Magistrature. But, in truth, the situation of Klaus is extremely delicate and very very ponderous: the one and only text which will give birth to the Union will be effectively depending on him.

Sending him a letter that can be found here below, Italiani Liberi (Free italians) wanted to encourage him to resist, and most of all wanted to tell him that he is not the only one who is worried for the Freedom of his Homeland. We hope that many of our readers will do their best to make this letter known in all the european States, so that Klaus will be reached by the solidarity of all those citizens who - as the Italians - were not allowed to express their will about the unification.

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
